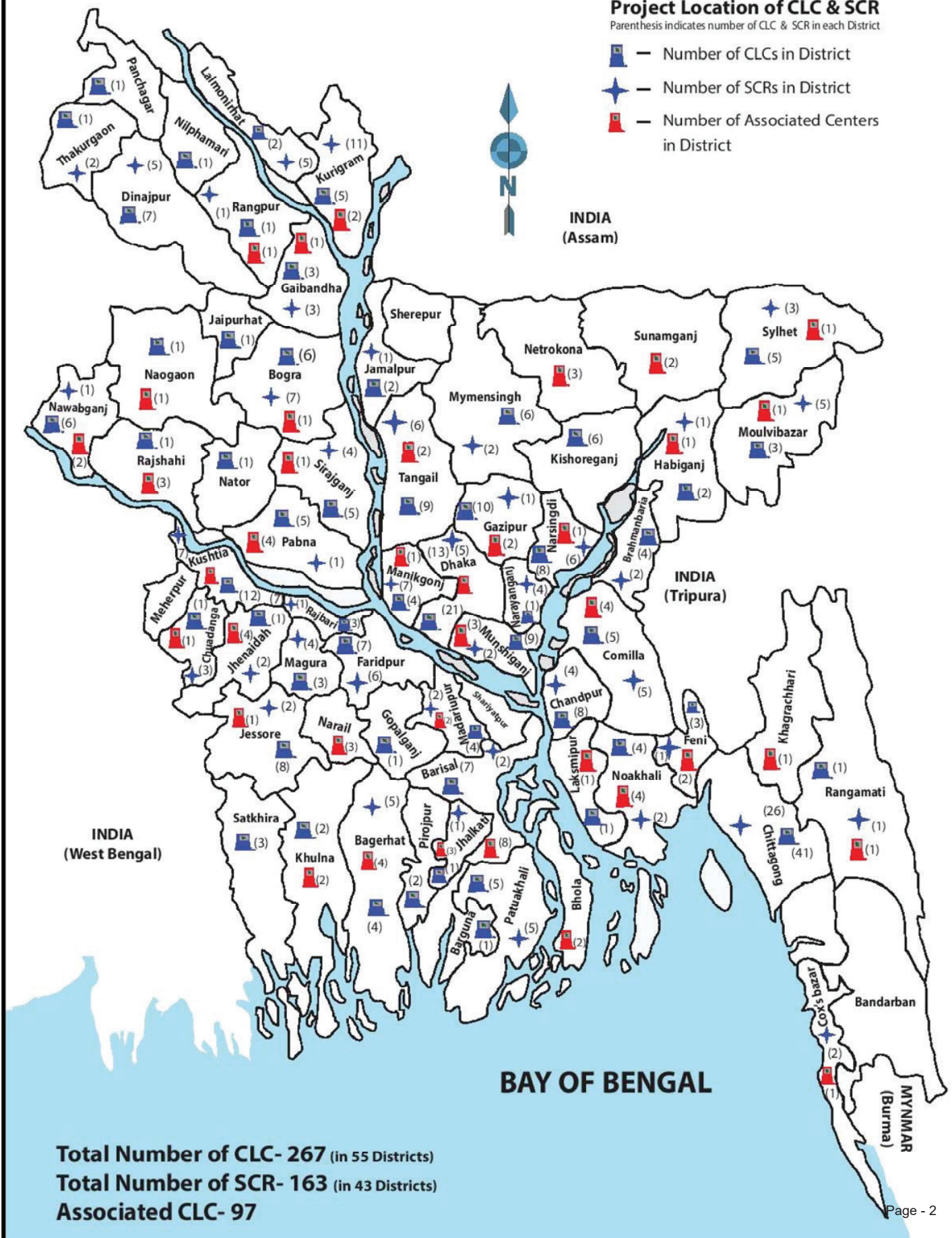

Computer Literacy Program for the Underprivileged (2004 -2019)



Evolving through innovation

Computer Literacy Program (CLP) turns fifteen in 2019. Over the last fifteen years, considerable progress has been made towards the principal CLP mission of empowering underprivileged youths through computer literacy and technology-aided education. Introduction of innovative projects and initiatives in a timely fashion and careful nurturing of those efforts has been the key to the progress. Mature CLP projects, such as, Computer Literacy Centers (CLCs) and Smart Class Rooms (SCRs) have spread throughout the country to provide hands-on computer literacy training, and exposure to multi-media instruction to thousands of students even in remote rural areas. Several hundred teachers have been trained to use CLC and/or SCR platforms.

Education through Entertainment (EE), a recent CLP project has taken roots. Following an initial test run in five schools, a pilot EE program is now running in 55 high schools across Bangladesh. In EE, students are exposed to entertaining educational and informative videos, documentaries, or movies on motivational subjects followed by lively participatory discussions. To date 26 such contents have been adapted from open sources. In 2020 CLP plans to host a multi-school content development competition to promote the program widely and enhance the contents library by incorporating some of the winning entries.



Smart Classroom(SCR)

Development of instruction and training materials has been an important byproduct of CLP efforts. Examples include 'Esho Computer Shikhi,' a students' guide for learning how to use computers; 'Computer Teaches Everyday English,' a CD to enhance students' listening comprehension and ability to converse in English; and detailed lesson plans and training materials for teachers.

CLP's most recent initiative, "Connect Students across the World" (CSAW) has the potential to bring together students from different countries, cultures and socio-economic backgrounds to develop cultural communication, friendship and understanding between citizens and leaders of tomorrow.

Another important initiative that CLP has most recently undertaken is to develop strategy for tapping into the energy, enthusiasm and skills of the younger generation and integrate them into leadership positions so that CLP could benefit from their technology expertise.

It has been our observation that many non-resident Bangladeshis (NRBs) have a desire to give back to the country that propelled them to life and prosperity. A bright example this year is Dr. Molla Fazlul Huq of Fullerton, CA, who has donated personally and raised funds from NRBs to renovate his high school building, and established CLCs and SCRs in two high schools in Sherpur of Bogura district in Bangladesh. He provided each CLC with 10 computers instead of typical four, thus introducing an "enhanced-CLC" model that enables more students to participate in any given time. He has also established SCRs in two schools. He is now seeking contributions from like-minded individuals to bring in CLCs and SCRs in remaining two schools of Sherpur. His is an example for others to emulate.

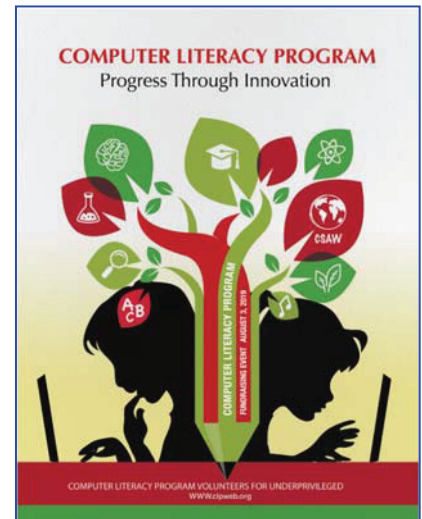

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Tonight's distinguished speakers

Dr. Nazrul Islam, Senior Economist, United Nations



Born in 1957, Nazrul Islam received his early education at Momenshahi (currently Mirzapur) Cadet College and Dhaka University. He received his M. Sc in Economics from Moscow State University and A. M. and Ph. D. degrees in Economics from Harvard University. He taught Economics at Dhaka University, Harvard University, Emory University, St. John's University, and Kyushu University (Japan). Currently, Dr. Islam is serving as a Senior Economist at the United Nations.

Dr. Islam is well known for his contribution to research in several areas of economics, including growth, development, transition, and environment. He has published twenty books and numerous articles in reputed international journals. A good part of Dr. Islam's research and publications has been devoted to issues of economics, politics, and environment of Bangladesh. Based on his extensive research, Dr. Islam has put forward a 10-point development strategy for Bangladesh. At the United Nations, he is engaged in research and policy formulation regarding global development issues.

Dr. Islam is also a prominent social and environmental activist. He is the founding secretary of the Social Research Center (Shamaj Gobeshona Kendra), established in 1982, while he was teaching at Dhaka University. He serves as an editor of Shamaj, Arthoniti, o Rashtrya, the journal of this Center.

In 1998, while teaching at Emory University, Dr. Islam founded Bangladesh Environment Network (BEN), as a network of non-resident Bangladeshis, committed to the protection of environment. Through BEN, he took the initiative, in 2000, to form Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (BAPA), as a united platform of pro-environment forces of the country. Since then BAPA and BEN have been working together for the protection of Bangladesh environment. Dr. Islam served as the Global Coordinator of BEN and Vice President of BAPA for the last twenty years. His current research also focuses more on issues of sustainable development. His most recent book, titled Rivers and Sustainable Development will come out soon from the Oxford University Press.

Dr. Islam is active in the Bangladeshi community life in New York. He served as the Convener of 2019 New York Bangla Book Fair that was held on June 13-16. He lives in Queens, New York, with his wife, Dr. Tanvira Islam, a child psychiatrist, and his son, Rahul, and daughter, Nusaybah.

Ms. Sadia Faizunnesa, Consul General of Bangladesh in New York



Ms. Sadia Faizunnesa has been the 15th Consul General of Bangladesh in New York, since June 1, 2018. She joined the Bangladesh Foreign Service on 25 January 1999 and belongs to 18th BCS (Foreign Affairs) cadre. Immediately before joining as Consul General she had served as the Director General, United Nations Wing at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Bangladesh. She has had previous experiences and on job training on consular and welfare activities for the Bangladeshi community in Germany, Austria and Czech Republic while she was posted at the Bangladesh Embassy in Berlin, Germany.


She had also served as Deputy Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the United Nations in New York; Counsellor, Head of Chancery and Deputy Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to ESCAP, Bangkok, Thailand; and in different capacities in the bilateral, multilateral and administration wings at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Dhaka.

She had actively participated as a member of Bangladesh delegation in the 68th, 69th, 70th, 71st and 72nd General Assembly of the United Nations. She also took part in the negotiations of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Agenda 2030 and also in the New York Declaration for refugees and migrants during her tenure at the Bangladesh Permanent Mission to the United Nations in New York. She facilitated the "Culture of Peace" resolution at the UN General Assembly (2013-2015) and co-facilitated the ECOSOC Humanitarian Resolution at the UN for three consecutive years (2014-2016). She had also worked as a member within Bangladesh Chairmanship of Ninth Global forum on Migration and Development GFMD (2016) task team. In her immediate past assignment as Director General (UN, Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs), she worked very closely in mobilizing support of the international community and facilitating humanitarian assistance for the forcibly displaced Rohingyas.

Ms. Faizunnesa completed her secondary and higher secondary education from Mymensingh Girl's Cadet College. She obtained the Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) from Sir Salimullah Medical College in Bangladesh. She obtained Masters Degree in Development Studies from BRAC University and attended professional diplomatic courses in India, Germany, France, Belgium, Republic of Korea, Malaysia, Australia and in the Bangladesh Foreign Service Academy.

Ms. Faizunnesa takes special interest in diaspora diplomacy and strongly believes that diaspora is the strong agent for promoting image of Bangladesh around the world. She has expressed commitment to deliver her best in upholding the interests and wellbeing of the Bangladeshi community. Ms. Faizunnesa has been conferred 'Declaration of Honor' by Queens Borough President Ms. Melinda Katz on 26 March 2019, in recognition of her public friendly Consular services and for outreaching the vibrant Bangladeshi-American community in New York.

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Wheels of Empowerment: CLP Projects and Initiatives

Computer Literacy Program (CLP) was launched in 2004 with the goal of empowering the underprivileged youth in Bangladesh through computer literacy and technology-aided education. In the intervening decade and a half CLP has spawned *projects* and taken *initiatives* to bridge the *digital divide* that exists between an underprivileged student in rural Bangladesh and a student from an affluent, educated family in a big city, not to mention with a student from a developed nation. Some of these projects have grown and evolved over the years and are now considered *mature*, some promising programs did not flourish as expected, while some are at the pilot stage ready to take off. This article is an attempt to look back, make an account of the efforts that were undertaken as we learn and chart course for the future.

Ongoing Projects and Initiatives

Computer Learning Centers: The first seminal project that CLP undertook was to establish Computer Learning Centers (CLCs) in educational institutions in rural Bangladesh. The impetus derived from the realization that making computers and hands-on computer training available to students would be the key to digital literacy. Every CLC has a computer lab run by trained teachers to provide students with hands-on training. Every computer lab is equipped with a minimum of four computers, one printer, other accessories and requisite furniture. Internet connection, where available, is also a part of this basic package.



In consultation with prominent computer scientists and educators in Bangladesh an introductory curriculum was developed. Based on that curriculum a student’s manual, “*Esho Computer Shikhi*” (*Let Us Learn about Computers*) in Bengali was published. Every student receives a copy of the manual at a nominal cost. Two teachers from each CLC receive two weeks of intensive training provided by professionals of Dnet, CLP’s implementation partner in Bangladesh. The teachers are also provided with complete “Teacher’s Manual” so that upon completing their training they can teach the students. The student manual, teacher’s manual and the curricula were updated as needed, especially when the Government introduced instruction in computer science in the school curriculum. The third edition of “*Esho Computer Shikhi*” was recently published.

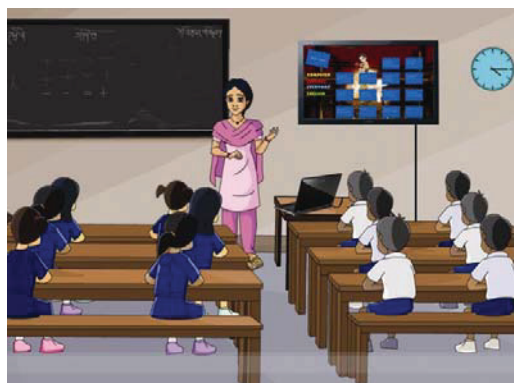
The *basic training* includes making students familiar with the physical parts and operation of the computer, and teaching them how to use Microsoft Word, Excel spreadsheet, and Paint programs. Students are also introduced to the world-wide web where Internet connection is available. Students in a batch of 8 to 10 receive hands-on training free of charge for one and a half hours a day, six days a week, thus completing forty-hour course in a month. Students receive a certificate after successful completion of the training program.

The computer instructions are provided outside of the school's normal schedule so as not to interfere with the regular academic activities. Since the teachers provide the computer instructions in addition to their regular duties, each teacher receives an honorarium of Tk 1200 after training a batch of students.

As of June 2019 CLP, in partnership with Dnet, local school administration as well as individual and institutional donors and sponsors, has established 267 CLCs in 55 districts of Bangladesh. As of 2019 June, these CLCs have trained over 110,000 students, 50% of those being females.

Smart Class Rooms

CLP launched the Smart Class Room (SCR) project in 2010 to adapt, for rural schools in Bangladesh, the revolution in education and mode of instruction that had been set in motion by advances in computer, communication and information technologies. The Internet, educational CDs, knowledge webs, multimedia instruction and other developments are changing the traditional “*teaching by telling*” to “*distributed learning*” that enables “*learning by doing*.” SCR initiative was CLP's forward-looking initiative to keep abreast of these developments.



CLP and Dnet leveraged the support provided by a Private Public Partnership (PPP) Initiative of the Government of Bangladesh to establish 100 SCRs and 100 CLCs over three years in rural secondary schools. The policy was to establish a SCR in a secondary school that already had a CLC, or where a CLC was being established at the same time. The resources of a CLC provide useful infrastructure for a SCR. In addition, every SCR is equipped with a 32” or larger

LCD monitor/TV with dedicated power supply and back-up solar power, educational CDs, a laptop and connection to the Internet where available. In the initial phase of development lessons in a SCR focused on four subjects: General Science, Geometry, English, and Geography. The CDs bring together sight, sound, and animation to be played on the laptop and projected on the widescreen monitor giving the students an exposure to multimedia learning. Today, some enthusiastic teachers download selected contents from the Internet and translate those into Bengali for classroom use. Contents from *Education through Entertainment*, another initiative to be discussed later in this article, are also enhancing the content library.

Teacher competency is a key component for the successful implementation of technology in education. Every school with SCR is expected to have at least four Dnet trained teachers, one for each subject, to run the SCR.

While the one-time support from the PPP Initiative expired, SCRs continue to be established with financial support from donors and sponsors. As of June 2019, there are 163 SCRs and 652

trained teachers (30% female). Typically, 60,000 students receive training in these SCRs every year.

Education through Entertainment

Education through Entertainment (EE) is a more recent CLP initiative that leverages on the computer and multimedia facilities at the CLCs and/or SCRs to provide students with an entertaining platform for acquiring knowledge. A major thrust is to instill in students values, such as tolerance, global awareness, environmental conscientiousness, empathy, and entrepreneurship. Another aim is to sharpen the communication skills of students through entertaining extra-curricular activities. Launched in 2016, the initiative first tested in five schools with SCRs. We have introduced the EE program in 55 schools across Bangladesh that includes 10 schools not covered under the CLP program.

While we expect the scope and format of EE to evolve, in the current form it involves use of engaging video(s) to draw students' attention to interesting and important topics. The topics intended to be covered and eventually collected in the EE content library may belong to diverse areas, such as, general knowledge, science, literature, arts, nature, history, geography, environment, personalities, current issues and events, health, medicine, entrepreneurship to name a few. The first step in the EE project involves selection of contents in the above-mentioned areas.

EE started with the following 14 open-source videos: *Visit Beautiful Places in Bangladesh, Language Movement, Life Story of Bill Gates, Balanced Diet, We'll Protect Ourselves, Be Kind, How to Succeed, Environmental Conservation, Apocalyptic Natural Disaster, Facts about Elephant, Global Fresh Water Challenge, Do What You are Good at, Build Good Habits, and Gain Wisdom from Stories*. These video pieces, adapted from different open sources were organized in a CD. The topics and videos received enthusiastic acceptance from students and teachers during the test run with five schools. Since then, the following 12 pieces have been added to the EE repertoire: *Rules and Manners, Unity, Physical Exercise, Wasfia's Journey, Our Universe, Tornado, Thunderstorm and Hail, Flood Safety, Earthquake Safety, Entrepreneurship, Cleanliness, Active Listening, and Climate Change*.

The next important step is presenting the above-mentioned contents to students. Here a student-club model, such as, that of a debating society, or a science club has been adopted. The EE project activity is organized in structured sessions. An EE session covers two regular class periods (approximately 90 minutes). Typically, a session is run on a Thursday after the regular classes are over. In a typical session one (or depending on the length, two) video(s) is (are) shown to students. Each video is accompanied by a lesson plan to guide the teacher on how to conduct the session and steer students' activities and discussions. After playing the video(s), the teacher opens the floor for discussion on the topic(s) covered by the video presentation. The focus here is to get every student (as opposed to enthusiastic few) to participate. The discussions among the students are steered so that they understand the intended teachings and develop action plans to translate their learning into practice as appropriate. For further details on the scope and organization of EE, please see the article on page 25 in the 2017 CLP Annual Event Magazine available online at <http://clpweb.org>. Based on the results of the pilot study, student interest, and status of content development it seems EE is ready to be deployed in schools with a CLC or/and a SCR.

While we look forward to wider dissemination of EE, there have been some interesting and favorable developments. DUDOK, the Anti-Corruption Commission of Bangladesh found some

of the EE content videos valuable for instilling moral values in students, and signed a memorandum of understanding with CLP, Kite Bangladesh Limited and Gunijan Trust to initiate a moral value *Education through Entertainment* pilot project. The pilot project first ran in the first cluster of 10 schools in Chittagong and involved over 12,000 students. The pilot is currently running in the second cluster of 12 schools in Lalmonirhat engaging more than 9,800 students. In addition, 33 schools with SCRs were provided with the EE content CD and instructions for teachers to initiate the project. To date, EE project is operational in 55 schools in Bangladesh.

Another particularly important spin-off of an EE session on *Respect Diversity* is developing into another new initiative, *Connect Students around the World (CSAW)*, which is outlined below.

Connect Students around the World

Connect Students around the World (CSAW) is a new initiative that grew out of the EE project in 2017. The aim of CSAW is to bring together students from different countries and cultures through joint projects and live video discussions. The goal is to foster cultural communication, friendship, and develop understanding between youths living in different corners of the world under diverse socio-economic conditions. To start with, students from William Annin Middle School (WAMS) in Basking Ridge, New Jersey, USA and Uddipon Badar-Shamsu Bidya Niketon (UBSBN) in Chaitali, Bagerhat, Bangladesh communicating in 2017. Participating students from each school produced a video of their neighborhood, seasonal changes in the environment, and a typical school day and exchanged the videos. In 2018 they undertook a project of reading, analyzing and interpreting Rabindranath Tagore's poem *Where the Mind is Without Fear*. Each group made a video presentation, exchanged it with the other group, and then participated in a Skype conversation that pertained not only to the poem but also to their respective schools, educational experiences, environments and aspects of daily life. This year students of



the two schools are participating in a project on *Climate Change due to Global Warming*. It was further observed that the technology tools used for CSAW communication could be used for long distance teaching. UBSBN, the school in Chaitali, attracted several volunteer teachers from across the world teaching long-distance classes, and thus sowed the seeds of a new CLP initiative “Remote Voluntary Teaching.”

CSAW is an initiative with immense potential. However, implementing it on a wider scale will require enthusiastic volunteers on both sides who will take initiatives to connect two schools from two countries and get the ball rolling.

Other Projects and Initiatives

CLP is a dynamic enterprise that adapts, expands and grows responding to the needs and demands of the time and changing educational and technological landscapes. Some short-term projects were completed, while some initiatives did not flourish as expected. What follows is a brief account of those efforts.

Computer Teaches Everyday English (CTEE) is an initiative that derived from the observation that though students start learning English in the Primary School, the existing curriculum does not adequately develop their listening comprehension and conversation ability. The goal of the CTEE project was to develop an English teaching compact disc (CD) that would combine sight, sound, animation and proper pronunciation to complement the existing curriculum and enable the students to learn interactively using the computers in their respective CLCs. The planning of the CD took into consideration different second-language teaching methods, the various ways of learning languages, contents of the English text books used in the schools in Bangladesh, as well as, inputs from English teachers and students who were interviewed (for details on the planning and subsequent development of the CD, please see the articles on CTEE in the CLP Annual Event Magazines for 2008 and 2009, respectively; available online at <http://clpweb.org>.) The CD has been developed and is being successfully used in CLCs and SCRs to complement classroom teaching of English for students from Class VI to Class X.

Community for Learning Information, Communication and Knowledge (CLICK) was an information technology (IT) based project devoted to providing advanced IT training to unemployed educated youth in rural Bangladesh so that they can find employment as IT professionals. The project was implemented by Dnet with support from Microsoft under its Unlimited Potential Program. Under this project 13 *Pallitathya Kendras* (Rural Information Centers) were established in 11 districts of Bangladesh. Based in community centers, the CLICK centers were supported by Microsoft through a cash grant equivalent to USD 100,000 as well as operating system and application software valued at USD 67,000. The hardware support came from local partner organizations. The objectives of the CLICK project were to: (a) create a global-standard technology learning space for underprivileged groups; (b) nurture technology skills for emerging ICT-based professions; (c) help community information centers achieve sustainability; and (d) enhance information and knowledge acquiring scope for youngsters in rural Bangladesh. Every *Pallitathya Kendra* was equipped with 7 computers, Microsoft Unlimited Potential (MSUP) curriculum, Internet connection, mobile phone, information and knowledge base and necessary logistics. After-School Club (ASC) and ***Continuing Professional Development for Teachers*** (CPDT) were two initiatives launched in 2013 by the British Council (BC) in Bangladesh that were of interest to CLP, and involved active BC-Dnet collaboration. Both the initiatives aimed at improving the quality of education and instruction in secondary schools in Bangladesh. The goal of ASC initiative was to enhance the Information and Computer Technology (ICT) and English competency of students in secondary schools through fun and game in a club-like setting. Students participating in the ASC initiative attended before- or after-school classes for 2 hours/week for 16 weeks. British Council developed a CD entitled *Learn English Kids Bangla* that included interactive features (games, puzzles, songs, drawing and short stories), and intended to develop four skills: reading, writing, listening and speaking. Students used the CD and play different games to enhance their English comprehension and communication skills. The ASC

initiative involved 20 centers, 10 of which were based in secondary schools and the other 10 in Rural Information and Technological Centers (RITCs) in its pilot phase. Ten of these centers were based in schools and RITCs with strong CLP activities. Based on the outcome of the pilot project, the intent was to implement the program for secondary schools across the country.

The objective of CPDT initiative was to ensure continued professional growth of secondary school teachers. The two-day long training program consisted of three modules: (1) Professional Development, (2) Global Citizenship, (3) and Intercultural Relationship. The aims of this training were to develop ICT and English skills, support global citizenship through awareness, and encourage collaboration and cultural interaction. Of 300 teachers targeted for training in 2013, 110 were from 55 CLCs established by CLP. The project continued through 2015, and 300 teachers were trained each year. Additional details on ASC and CPDT appear in a related article in 2013 CLP Annual Event Magazine available online at <http://clpweb.org>. British Council introduced a next level training program title “Connecting Classroom Core Skills Training”. Some CLP school teachers are participating in this training program.

Looking Ahead

Based on the above brief overview of the projects and initiatives several observations may be made. *First*, over the last fifteen years CLP has progressed through innovation, adapting and implementing selected advances in educational technology to rural schools in Bangladesh. *Second*, these projects and initiatives have been nurtured and developed through years to culminate in a “CLP Model” that may be readily implemented in educational institutions elsewhere. *Third*, the mature projects, such as CLC and SCR, have enhanced the educational experience of several hundred thousand students, and trained several hundred teachers in technology-enhanced education. These numbers may only grow with time. *Fourth*, quality instruction and training materials have been developed both for students and teachers. These materials are useful not only for CLP projects, but are also beneficial for any institution or individual interested in fostering technology-enhanced education. *Fifth*, the results and lessons learned even from short-term projects were successfully incorporated in subsequent efforts. For example, the *After School Club* idea has been incorporated into the design of *Education through Entertainment* project. *Finally*, it has been gratifying to note that CLP projects, such as, CLC and SCR were forerunners of projects that had of late been introduced in secondary schools by the “Digital Bangladesh” initiative of the government.

We envision immense transformational potential of CSAW, EE and CLICK projects. Our CSAW experience, though limited at this point, clearly demonstrates how well students across the continents with very different life experiences as well as cultural and socio-economic conditions can connect. Widely implemented, such connection can go a long way in bringing future citizens and leaders of nations together!

The computer and information technology environment in Bangladesh has advanced substantially since the CLICK was first implemented. CLICK-like projects have the potential to enhance the self-employment and entrepreneurial opportunities in rural communities.

CLP experience has been a pleasant ride so far. We look forward to a more exciting journey ahead!

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Computer Literacy Center and Smart Classroom at Shakrail High School

We visited Shakrail High School on 29th January 2019. Shakrail High School is a well-known and reputed secondary school situated in sub-district Shivalaya of Manikganj district, some 80 kilometers east of Dhaka.

At present 694 students (55% female) are enrolled in this institution with a faculty of 19 teachers (3 female). The school is spread over three buildings one, two and one three-storied.. Mr. Sushil Kumar Saha has been at the helm of the institution as Headmaster since 2011. Academically, Shakrail has done well. The SSC (Secondary School Certificate) examination passing rate has been as high as 90% over 2017-2019. In 2017, five students graduated with a GPA of 5.

We started our journey early in the morning from Dhaka and reached the school at 10:45 AM. On our way, we took a break at Parjoton Restaurant across the *Jatiyo Smriti Shoudh* (National Martyrs' Memorial) at Nabi Nagar. When we reached the school, the morning assembly was being conducted. Students were singing the National Anthem. We had a short discussion with Mr. Jamaluddin, the Assistant Headmaster. The Head Master was away for a meeting with the Deputy Commissioner

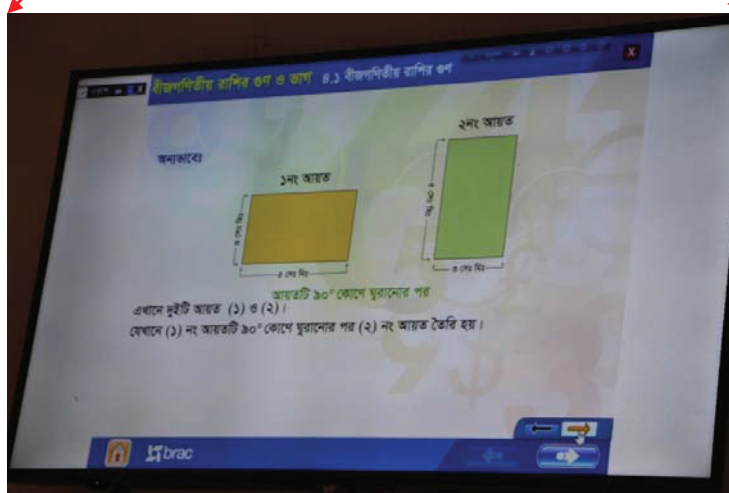


Pursuant to the Bangladesh Government's push for promoting Information and Communication Technology in Education (ICTE), the school administration established a CLC (Computer Literacy Center) and a SCR (Smart Classroom) in 2018 November with the assistance of CLP-USA and its Bangladesh partner Dnet. A plaque posted on the wall of the smart class room (shown in the picture) says that Non-resident Bangladeshi Dr.

Abu Saeed Jamaluddin a Houston, Texas resident sponsored the SCR in his village school in memory of his parents. These additions have significantly advanced computer literacy and technology-aided education in Shakrail High.

In a CLC, students learn basic computer skills, which they use in their present studies and which will be the stepping stone for their future professional life. While students in some areas of Bangladesh have some exposure to computer literacy, until 2017 students in Shakrail were destined to graduate from school without ever touching a computer key board. The CLC and the SCR goes a long way to cross the digital divide that exists between urban and rural areas of the country. In the CLC, students receive hands-on training on basic computer usage. A 40 hours structured curriculum has been developed for this training. The students follow a manual, "*Esho Computer Shikhi*" (Let Us Learn How to Use a Computer) expressly developed for the program. On the other hand, SCR is used for the Government's main-stream curricula. SCR is a multimedia-based classroom equipped with a 55-inch LED TV and an IPS. With the help of a laptop, teachers run classes and present subject matters using animations, video clips and

games, for a stimulated learning process. Four teachers, one for each subject, have been trained to run classes effectively. Educational CDs on English, Mathematics, Geography and Science in have been provided. Teachers are also provided with training for developing contents and downloading relevant materials from open sources.

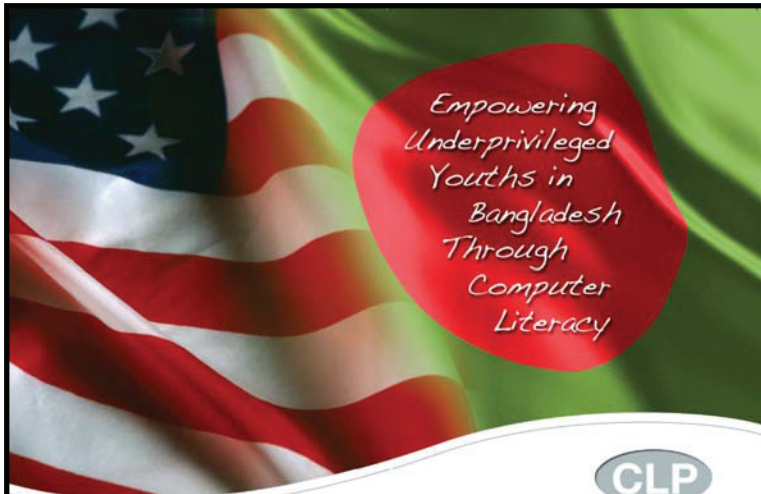


We observed the Math teacher, Mr. Abdul Wadud conduct math class using digital contents. He engaged students in group work. Afterwards, the students presented the results of their group activities.

Next, we visited the Computer Literacy Center (CLC). Ms. Anjuara Begum conducted the session. A facilitator assisted students to work on Microsoft Office programs. We found students were capable of developing Microsoft Word and PowerPoint files and save their work in files and folders. The students' excitement was palpable. The contrast between motivation of the students in SCR and other class rooms was clearly obvious.

We returned Dhaka at evening hours with a good experience in that school.

Promoting Science Education and Computer Literacy in Sherpur Schools

Sherpur D. J. High School, in the town of Sherpur, Bogura, Bangladesh, has a special place in my heart. My family sought refuge in Sherpur, following a communal violence, from my village Ichhapur, Bardhaman, West Bengal, India. When my family went back home, I choose to stay behind by myself and finish my education. It was this school and its teachers that prepared me for my future and the world I would face. I matriculated from the school in 1953.

I went on to complete my Intermediate from Jagannath College, and then my Bachelor and Master degrees from the Dhaka University in Bangladesh. After graduation, I taught for a while in Jagannath College, then Holy Cross College and finally Agriculture University in Mymensingh. Then I left Bangladesh for College Station, Texas, USA to get my Ph. D from Texas A & M University. Over the years as I was building a strong social and family life, while establishing myself professionally, I kept reflecting about my high school days. The path to my success begun at Sherpur D. J. High school and I wondered how my old school was doing.

I visited the school in 2013, and was saddened to see the dilapidated condition of the school building. I felt I owed the school for my success and needed to give back. After talking to the



school administrators, we all felt it would be ideal if we could restore the school to its original 1868 form. A local engineering and construction firm quoted us a \$45,000 renovation cost. After returning to US, with the help of the expatriate Bangladeshi community we were able to raise the necessary funds. In 2016, the funds were handed over to SpaandanB, a Bangladeshi nonprofit organization in Silicon Valley to get the renovation work

done. After delays and cost increase to \$85K, the renovation was completed in December of 2018. The expatriate Bangladeshi community covered the additional cost as well. Beside the renovation, the school also needed additional support in several areas, such as scholarship for students, library collection and science and technology laboratory. Here is what was done to address these needs.

Majority of the students, who attended the school, come from a humble economic background. Moreover, in every class there are talented students, who could shine if they were given the proper opportunities. So, we established a limited number of scholarships. It is gratifying to note the transformational effect of these scholarships; two cases merit mentioning. One student was born disabled, and was writing with his toes. That student is now in college and we are still supporting him. Another talented student whose parents suddenly died of cholera was able to complete high school and now attending college with the support of the scholarship.

As I paid close attention to the academics, I noticed that the curriculum requires lab exercises for Biology, Chemistry and Physics, but there were no labs. In consultation with the school



administration we purchased lab equipment for the three subject areas and a lab space was designated as well. Lab manuals and teacher training are needed for the labs to be operational. We also purchased new books suggested by the teachers to rebuild the library collection.

During our conversation with the administrators we inferred that there are no specialized teachers for math. Assuming that the school may not be able to afford qualified math teachers in the near future, a different approach was needed. In the US, Khan Academy is well

known for online high-quality math teaching program. *Agami*, a non-profit Bangladeshi organization, chose Khan Academy math videos that are aligned with math curriculum for different grade levels in Bangladesh and translated those into Bengali. For small fee and by request, *Agami* was able to send their math specialist to whichever school needed the support. I paid for only one class, to see how it would work out. Unfortunately, the approach seemed to have hurt the pride of local teachers and got stalled. So, I did not pursue it further. However, I thought perhaps introducing technology-aided education to the school maybe an alternate solution.

To prepare school students for the 21st century, the Bangladesh government required schools to teach computer usage to the kids. They provided a curriculum, three computers and a computer specialist to teach. At D. J. High school the class size was approximately 50 students. Of the three computers, only one was functioning. The specialist was teaching computer science as a theory showing the function of each key.

We donated 15 computers, although yet short of the number needed but at least now the students are able to take turn and learn by touching the key board. In 2018, we introduced CLP's computer literacy training curriculum, 'Esho Computer Shikhi' in a lab which had 18 computers. With CLP's help we established two smart class rooms (SCRs), each with a 53" flat screen TV connected to a laptop and internet connection. One of the class rooms was furnished with distant teaching facility. Another class room was furnished with smart board and internet connection. Teachers were trained on how to use the equipment, how to download contents from the Internet, and how to make power point and/or video presentations. Teachers were also trained to make lesson plans. The school is also using CLP's Education through Entertainment (EE) learning program. EE aims to deliver knowledge and values in a playful class room environment by sharing pre-selected videos that discuss a topic of interest to the class. This video is then complemented by role play and interactive discussions.

In 2018 we helped Mujibur Rahman Monjoo Girl's High School to establish a technology center. The Center has a computer lab with 20 laptops, and furniture so that two students can use one lap top. The school agreed to cap the class size to 40. And then there were two SCRs; one with distant teaching facility. All three rooms had equipment to handle short-term power failure. These flat

screen TV monitors fitted with lap top and internet made learning interesting and teaching exiting. We facilitated teachers training as well.

We are now planning to bring technology-aided education to the remaining high schools and primary schools in Sherpur. For 2020, we have targeted the Town Colony High School and the Krishnapur Primary School. We are in communication with respective school administrators.



My work with teachers, administrators and the expatriate Bangladeshi community in the US provided me with some useful insights, which include: Members of the community are willing to support education enhancement activities in the country.

- Teachers do not like sweeping changes. Careful persuasion is necessary to introduce new approaches.
- A system should be in place for evaluating teachers' performance, so that teachers may be provided with guidance and feedback for improvement.
- Students should be tested more frequently than the current system of giving a mid-term and a final examination.
- Course in "Leadership" is lacking. Students need to be taught and developed in three components of leadership: Leadership, Ethics and Conflict Resolution.

With advances in computer, internet and communication technologies, we have a unique opportunity to enhance the Bangladesh education system in general and more specifically the remote areas. How well we make use of this opportunity will have a considerable impact on the future.

জাপানে আসার পর থেকে মনে হয় যে আমি আমার একটা পুরো সংসার বাংলাদেশে ফেলে এসেছি, সেটা সিএলপি-র সংসার। এখনো বরগুনা, বরিশাল, কুড়িগ্রাম ব্রাহ্মণবাড়িয়া, বাগেরহাট, কুষ্টিয়া, চট্টগ্রাম, সিরাজগঞ্জ, কুমিল্লাসহ বিভিন্ন জেলার স্যারেরা আমাকে নক করেন, কুশল জিজ্ঞাসা করেন। আমিও তাদের কাছে স্কুলের খবর নিই। এরপরেও কেন জানি নিজের কাছে খুব পরপর লাগে। হয়ত দূরত্বের কারণেই এখন মনে হয় যে আমি হয়তো আর সেই আগের সিএলপি-র একনিষ্ঠ ভক্তটি নেই।

সত্যিকার অর্থে আমার জীবনের সাথে সিএলপি-র যে ঘনিষ্ঠতা সেটা মনে হয় না আর কারো সাথে হয়েছে। আপনি ইতোমধ্যে জানেন সেই হাই স্কুল থেকে শুরু করে ডিনেটের মাধ্যম দিয়ে সিএলপি প্রজেক্টে আমার ইন্টানশীপ করা এবং পরবর্তীতে আমার কর্ম জীবনের সবটুকুই সিএলপির জন্য ছিল। এটা একটা সৌভাগ্যের ব্যাপার আমার কাছে। সিএলপি কে গড়তে কতটুকু সাহায্য করতে পেরেছি জানি না, তবে সিএলপি আমাকে গড়ে দিয়েছে। আমি সারা দেশ ঘুরে দেখেছি, মানুষের সাথে মিশেছি, কথা বলেছি, শিক্ষক, শিক্ষা প্রতিষ্ঠান সম্পর্কে জেনেছি, বিভিন্ন ধরনের প্রাকৃতিক ও মানবসৃষ্ট আবহাওয়ার প্রতিকূলতা উপলব্ধি করেছি, বিশ্বাস অর্জন করেছি, শিক্ষার্থীদের অপলক দৃষ্টিতে ঠায় পেয়েছি। এজন্য আমি অবশ্যই আজন্মকাল সিএলপির প্রতি কৃতজ্ঞ।

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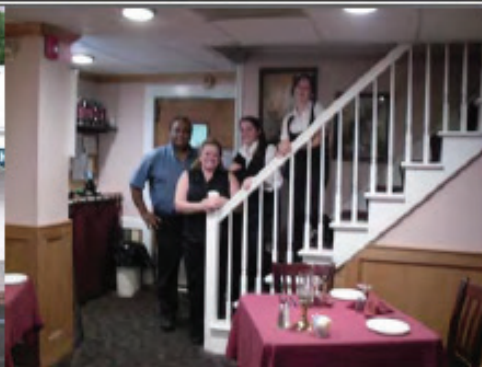
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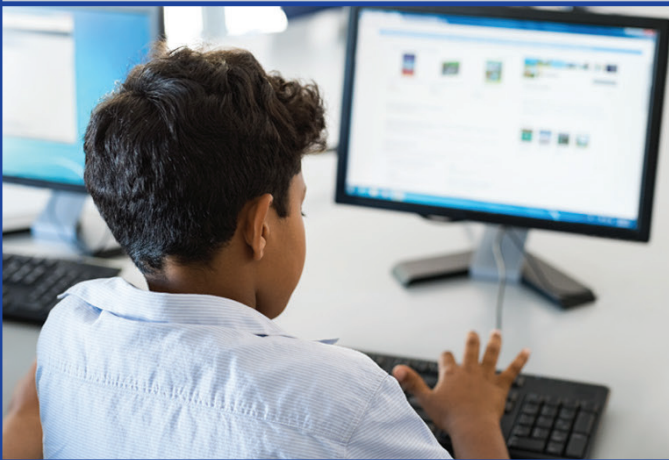
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
