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

Computer Literacy Program for the Underprivileged (2004 - 2022) Promoting digital learning



We report with guarded optimism that the eighteenth year of CLP is progressing well as schools reopened, students filled the classrooms and the world learned to operate within the dynamic limitations posed by the pandemic. CLP continued to establish new infrastructure, rejuvenate flailing resources, develop innovative approaches, and expand established programs.

There have been exciting developments in the area of remote voluntary teaching (RVT). Rafa Sattar, Founder and President of Fera Foundation, has been recognized with the 2022 Diana Award which "honors young people who work to improve the lives of others." Fera Foundation collaborates with CLP on remote voluntary teaching. CLP nominated Rafa for the award, which honors the legacy of Diana, Princess of Wales. CLP congratulates Rafa on this significant achievement. More about CLP's role as an enabler appears in Rafa's article elsewhere in the magazine.

An innovative development in RVT is the introduction of the *Expert Guided Learning (EGL)* initiative which is expected to bring the outstanding remote lessons taught by an expert teacher (ET) to any technologically ready classrooms anywhere without having to depend on costly and sometimes unreliable Internet connection. The approach involves video recording of the classes taught by an ET, editing those to erase classroom voices and noises, and using the edited videotapes as instruction materials for subsequent delivery of the course by a local teacher. Pilot implementation of the approach using English as a second language (ESL) course taught by an outstanding ET has already generated avid interest and substantial enthusiasm among students and local teachers. Details of the EGL approach appear in a related article in this magazine.

Continuing on the core mission of providing access to computers and technology-aided education to rural youths, CLP has established *eight* new Computer Literacy Centers (CLCs) and *fourteen* new Smart Classrooms (SCRs) in 2022. Another important development has been the rejuvenation of several "*tokai*" centers, CLCs that fail to operate adequately due to lack of maintenance support. CLP's appeal for help culminated in recent support for *eleven* such *tokai* centers from sponsors. CLP needs more sponsors to make other *tokai* centers fully operational.

CLP provides a useful platform for others to innovate. Dr. Molla Huq, an education enthusiast based in California, has been instrumental in raising funds and establishing 8 CLCs and 19 SCRs in secondary schools at Sherpur, Bogura. He is now developing a model so that schools in his "Sherpur Project" operate as a family, helping one another, and participating in club activities, such as, a science and technology fair, a cultural competition, etc. Such collaborations will create enthusiasm, develop friendships, and benefit students and teachers through exchange of information and ideas. The model may be emulated by any neighboring clusters of CLP schools elsewhere in the country.



He won many awards, including the Ekushey Padak (1989) and the CJFB (Cultural Journalists Forum of Bangladesh) Lifetime Achievement Award (2008).

Computer Literacy Program Today

Computer Literacy Program for the Underprivileged (CLP), a voluntary charitable organization of non-resident Bangladeshis (NRBs) based in the United States, undertook an initiative to introduce tools of digital education in rural Bangladesh in 2004. *The mission was to empower the underprivileged youths in Bangladesh through computer literacy and technology-enhanced education*. The target group was students in junior schools (Classes VI – VIII), secondary schools (Classes VI – X), and higher secondary colleges (Classes XI and XII). As the relevant technologies, ICT infrastructure of the country, governmental programs, national curriculum, and other relevant parameters evolved over the intervening years CLP adapted and expanded the scope and aims of the program. This article presents an overview of the various aspects of the CLP initiative, the programs and interventions implemented in various stages, the outcomes, and lessons learned.

CLP Projects




Fig.1. Timeline for rolling out of the CLP projects. [CLC = Computer Literacy Center; SCR = Smart Classroom; EE = Education through Entertainment; CSAW = Connect Students Around the World; RVT- Remote Voluntary Teaching; ELM = E-Learning Methods] *Computer Literacy Center:* CLP started establishing Computer Literacy Centers (CLCs) as a first step of introducing computer literacy and ICT in rural schools. In selecting the sites for CLCs, careful considerations were given to geographical location, availability of electricity, as well as interest and commitment of the school management.

CLP strategy was to first develop the basic infrastructure, namely providing access to computers and the Internet (where available), and then to gradually introduce digital contents and classroom. The schematic diagram (Fig. 1) below presents the timeline for rolling out different projects.


Every CLC has a computer lab equipped with a minimum of four computers, one printer, other accessories, requisite furniture, and Internet connection where available. In consultation with prominent computer scientists and educators in Bangladesh an introductory curriculum was developed. Based on that curriculum a student's manual, "*Esho Computer Shikhi*" (*Let Us Learn Computers*) in Bangla was published. Every student receives a copy of the manual at a nominal cost. Two teachers from each CLC receive two weeks of intensive training from professionals at Dnet, CLP's implementation partner in Bangladesh. The teachers receive a complete "Teachers Manual." The student manual, teacher's manual and the curricula are updated as needed, or mandated by the education policy of the Government.

The basic training includes making students familiar with the components and operation of a computer, and teaching them how to use Microsoft Word, Excel spreadsheet, and Paint programs. Students are also introduced to the world-wide web as Internet connection is now available almost everywhere. Students in a batch

of 8 or more (depending on the available number of computes at the CLC, on 2 students per computer basis) receive hands-on training free of charge for one and a half hours a day for 26 days, a total of 39 hours. Students receive a certificate after successful completion of the training program. Since the teachers provide the computer instructions in addition to their regular duties, each teacher receive an honorarium after having trained a batch of students.

As of 30 September 2022, 295 CLCs have been established in 54 districts of Bangladesh. CLCs provide the foundation and basic infrastructure for subsequent implementation of other digital literacy projects.

Smart Classroom: Smart Classroom (SCR) initiative was CLP's next important step to introduce elements of emerging educational technologies and multi-media mode of teaching and learning in rural Bangladesh. It started in 2009 as a pilot program to establish 100 SCRs and 100 CLCs

over next three years (2010–2012) in rural secondary schools under a Public Private Partnership (PPP) Initiative of the Government of Bangladesh.

In addition to CLC resources, every SCR is equipped with a 32 inch or larger LCD monitor/TV with back-up solar power, educational CDs, a laptop and connection to the Internet where available. In the initial phase of development of lessons in a SCR, we focused on four subjects: General Science, Geometry, English, and Geography. The contents were available on CDs prepared by local experts to ensure students' familiarity with linguistic and cultural underpinnings where relevant. The CDs bring together sight, sound, and animation to be played on the laptop and projected on the widescreen monitor giving the students an exposure to multimedia learning. Not only did these CDs enable quality classroom education for the students, but also served as useful refresher tools for teachers. Four teachers, one for each of the four subjects, from every school were trained by Dnet professionals in the use of the technology and accessing and adapting contents from the web. As better Internet connections became available, selected contents from the web, YouTube, and other open sources were adopted and adapted for use in SCRs. Some enthusiastic teachers went on to develop their own contents.

Education through Entertainment: Launched in 2016, Education through Entertainment (EE) leverages computer and multimedia facilities at the CLCs and/or SCRs to provide students with an entertaining platform for acquiring knowledge. A major thrust is to instill, in students, values such as tolerance, global awareness, environmental conscientiousness, empathy, civic responsibilities, and entrepreneurship. Another aim is to sharpen their communication skills through entertaining extra-curricular activities. The initiative was first run in five schools with SCRs. It has since been introduced in 70 schools including 25 non-CLP schools.

EE started with the following 14 open-source videos: Visit Beautiful Places in Bangladesh, Language Movement, Life Story of Bill Gates, Balanced Diet, We'll Protect Ourselves, Be Kind, How to Succeed, Environmental Conservation, Apocalyptic Natural Disaster, Facts about Elephant, Global Fresh Water Challenge, Do What You are Good at, Build Good Habits, and Gain Wisdom from Stories. These videos, adapted from different open sources were organized in a CD. The topics and videos received enthusiastic acceptance from students and teachers during the test run with five schools. Since then, the following 12 pieces have been added to the EE repertoire: Rules and Manners, Unity, Physical Exercise, Wasfia's Journey, Our Universe, Tornado, Thunderstorm and Hail, Flood Safety, Earthquake Safety, Entrepreneurship, Cleanliness, Active Listening, and Climate Change.

The model for a student-club is used to present the above-mentioned contents to students. An EE session covers two regular class periods (approximately 90 minutes), typically on a Thursday at the end of regular classes. A typical session involves showing students a video, followed by a discussion session that strives to get every student, as opposed to just an enthusiastic few, to participate. A teacher steers the discussion to ensure that the students understand the intended teachings and develop action plans to translate their learning into a practice.

In another development, DUDOK, the Anti-Corruption Commission of Bangladesh found some of the EE content videos valuable for instilling moral and civic values in students and established a collaboration to initiate a *moral value EE* pilot project. The pilot project was run first in a cluster of 10 schools in Chittagong involving over 8,000 students, second in a cluster of 12 schools in Lalmonirhat engaging more than 9,800 students, and third in a cluster of 18 schools in Thakurgaon with more than 12,000 students.

Connect Students around the World: Connect Students around the World (CSAW) grew out of the EE project in 2017. The aim of CSAW is to bring together students from different countries and cultures through joint projects and live video discussions. The goal is to foster cultural communication, friendship, and develop understanding between youths living in different corners of the world under diverse socio-economic conditions.

CSAW first connected a group of students from William Annin Middle School (WAMS) in Basking Ridge, New Jersey, USA with a similar group at Uddipon Badar-Shamsu Bidya Niketon (UBSBN) in Chitali, Bagerhat, Bangladesh in 2017. Each group produced a video of their neighborhood, seasonal changes in the environment, a typical school day; exchanged the videos and met in a virtual conference (Fig.3). In 2018 they undertook a project of reading, analyzing, and interpreting Rabindranath Tagore's poem *Where the Mind is Without Fear*. Each group made a video presentation, exchanged it with the other group, and then participated in a Skype conversation that pertained not only to the poem but also to their respective schools, educational experiences, environments, and aspects of daily life. In 2019, students of the two schools participated in a project on *Climate Change due to Global Warming*.

The pandemic induced a temporary pause to the CSAW activities since normal school operation was disrupted. A second pair of schools has added the program in 2022. We expect this interesting program to expand slowly as the schools resume normal operation. CSAW has immense potential. However, implementing it on a wider scale will require enthusiastic teachers and volunteers on both sides.

Remote Voluntary Teaching: Remote Voluntary Teaching (RVT) is a more recent CLP initiative with considerable potential for improving the learning experience of students in rural Bangladesh. It was observed that the technology tools used for CSAW communication could be used for longdistance teaching. UBSBN, the school at Chitali mentioned above, was the first institution to introduce RVT and run it successfully for several years. Several volunteer teachers from across the world now teach 12 classes on Biology, Chemistry, English, Mathematics and Physics every week via Zoom in that school.

RVT generated avid interest among students, parents, local teachers, and volunteer teachers. As the classes in rural schools in Bangladesh resumed after the pandemic shut down, four more schools initiated the RVT program, and more would follow. Volunteer teachers include NRB professionals, professionals within Bangladesh, second generation Bangladeshi American students and some of their peers who even are not of Bangladeshi origin. While NRB volunteer teachers are motivated by a desire to give back to the community that nurtured them, the second-generation high school students value the volunteering experience and credit as well as the opportunity to interact with students in another country. Local teachers enjoy the experience of working with and benefitting from interactions with teachers from a different education system.

There seems to be an awareness of the inadequacy of English competency among students and educators. Consequently, English language and Creative English Writing classes are among the popular subjects. Recently, CLP has established collaboration with Fera Foundation, an organization devoted to helping the marginalized communities in Bangladesh through remote services, to recruit volunteer teachers and manage RVT classes in some of the CLP schools.

While the relative efficacy of remote versus face-to-face instructions is a matter of contention, RVT made the underprivileged students in an orphanage in Gazipur among the most privileged when it came to attending classes during the pandemic. Under normal circumstances students from the orphanage used to attend nearby township schools. As those schools were closed during the pandemic, the orphanage was able to run over 30 classes per week covering different subjects within its own premises using the distant instruction resources of its SCR and services of remote volunteer teachers provided by CLP and Fera Foundation!

The RVT program is highly sought after by the CLP schools with SCR. However, scaling up and widespread use of this model have several limitations. First, one volunteer teacher teaching a class mode would require many volunteers, which may not be readily available. All teachers are not equally gifted as instructors. Finding and selecting skilled volunteer teachers consume considerable time and manpower that CLP presently cannot afford. Second, sizeable efforts are also required for coordinating each remote class. Third, time difference between volunteer location and Bangladesh that restricts class timing and number of classes that may be offered in a SCR per day. Then there are concerns about the availability, quality, dependability, and cost of

the Internet connection. A new program EGL (Expert Guided Learning) is designed to alleviate these limitations and use the exemplary lessons by a master instructor to teach numerous students at different schools following their own schedules and timetables. The EGL (detailed in an another article in this magazine) model is currently being piloted in 17 schools for English teaching.

Teacher's Training in e-Learning Methods: facing the Pandemic

The pandemic posed the CLP-Dnet team with new challenges to deal with. After the initial transients had steadied out, Dnet resumed the process of establishing the CLCs and SCRs that were in the pipeline. However, training of the teachers, which used to be conducted in person, became a challenge. The challenge was met by developing training modules and conducting the training remotely. Twenty-five teachers from five institutions received training on computer fundamentals, digital pedagogy, conducting smart classroom (SCR) sessions effectively, developing own contents for SCRs, and how to train students on basic computer operation and use of key Microsoft office software. These training modules will be useful for teacher's training even after the pandemic.

Dnet also provided remote support for teachers from 18 CLP affiliated schools to start online classes. Unfortunately, only 15% to 20% students could attend the classes since others did not have the resources. However, as noted above, the residential orphanage at Gazipur was able to use its CLC and SCR resources to offer classes taught by remote volunteers during the pandemic shutdown.

Accomplishments

An important measure of success of an educational program is the number of students it trains. In 2004 the CLP started with the objective of setting up 20 CLCs, and through September 2022, we have established 295 CLCs. More than 134,400 students completed the basic computer literacy training and earned their certificates from these CLCs between 2005 to 2021. Approximately 44% of these graduates are female students. While comprehensive data are missing, many of these graduates are known to have pursued professional careers in IT fields and some started their own small businesses. Recently, CLP has secured support from Technuf, an NRB-owned IT company to create a database of computer literacy graduates.

An SCR can accommodate many more students in one session than the 8 or more (2 per computer) that may participate in a CLC lab session. Consequently, the number of students impacted by SCRs is significantly higher. It is estimated that 95,000 students benefit every year from the 193 SCRs in 43 districts of Bangladesh. Approximately 49% of these are female students.

Trained teachers are crucial to the success of any educational undertaking. So, CLP placed major emphasis on training teachers both for running the CLCs and for the SCRs. Total number of CLC teachers and SCR teachers trained stand at 629 (~24% female) and 721 (~25% female), CLP activities and programs were cited in schol-arly investigations. Frederic Kastner, a graduate student at the University of Hildesheim, Germany conducted a study entitled *"Inclusive e-learning Practice in Developing Countries: Recommendations for Nongovern-mental Organizations."* He commended CLP's focus on learning by doing; inclusion of all potential users in the local communities; and commitment to joining collaborative endeavors with the government and other entities. In pursuing his Ph.D. thesis, *"Secondary Educational Institution Centered Diffusion of information and communication technology (ICT) in Rural Bangladesh"* at the University of Aaolberg in Denmark, Md. Saifuddin Khalid made an innovative use of a CLC and a SCR. To understand the "barriers to the integration and adoption of ICT" in secondary educational institutions in rural Bangladesh and explore ways to circumvent those, he sponsored the establishment of a CLC and a SCR at a rural private vocational school and conducted two livein field studies.

CLP attracted attention from entities within and outside of Bangladesh from the very beginning. Media in Bangladesh covered CLP events and achievements in numerous reports and news articles over the years. In 2009 CLP was recognized as the best e-learning program in South Asia and was bestowed the "Manthan Award South Asia 2009". The Manthan award is conferred every year by Digital Empowerment Foundation, a Delhi-based non-profit organization in collaboration with the Information Technology Department of the Government of India and several non-Government organizations.

Meaningful recognition of CLP activities come from individuals who contribute to CLP mission, and organizations, such as, Bank of Asia, Standard Chartered Bank, British Council Bangladesh, Intel, Relief International, Sentrana Corp., Imdad-Sitara Khan Foundation, NABIC, SpaandanB and others that collaborate on various projects and donate funds for program activities. In particular, British Council (BC) has involved CLP and Dnet participation in several instances when it rolled out new educational and enrichment programs.

Summary

CLP started on a lone journey in 2004, but there have been many changes since then. Digital Bangladesh initiative of the Government led to the establishment of computer labs and multimedia classrooms in many schools, and digital technologies are being used in different spheres of activities.

CLP has developed a structured approach for diffusion of digital literacy and introduction of digital education in rural Bangladesh. The baseline physical infrastructure is provided by the computers, audio-visual, and ICT equipment in the CLCs and SCRs. CLP curriculum teaches basic computer operation, usage of common software, and how to access the Internet and the web. Lessons in a SCR expose the students to multi-media instruction and vast educational resources beyond the textbook. EE and CSAW present informal, club-like atmosphere for collaboration and learning from peers and enjoyable activities using digital tools. English lessons by RVT volunteers add the advantage of learning from native speakers of the language. RVT often brings highly qualified experts as teachers for "difficult subjects" such as Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and advanced Mathematics. CLP initiatives are modular in nature and may be implemented in phases.

Some reflections on the CLP experiences and lessons learned over these years are in order. First, it is gratifying to observe how even a modest but thoughtful investment in youth education generate palpable return. At present, it only takes \$10 (~Taka 850) to produce a computer literate student! Cost of providing a student with multimedia learning experience is even lower.

Second, approximately 50% of the students completing the computer literacy training are female, while less than 30% of the trained teachers are female. Gender parity among students is intriguing given that even in advanced countries such as the US female students are very much underrepresented in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) disciplines.

Third, irrespective of the debate about the efficacy of in-person versus remote instruction, remote voluntary teaching can be a resource for rural schools that sometimes struggles to find competent teachers to teach certain subjects.

Fourth, non-resident Bangladeshis (NRBs) can be a resource and play a useful role in the diffusion of digital technology and education in rural Bangladesh. Many NRBs cherish a desire to reach back and contribute to the community that supported them during their formative years.

A salient feature of the CLP projects is that these can be implemented in other non-CLP schools that have computers and other multi-media resources but lack structured activities to pursue. Recently, a group of teachers from several non-CLP schools approached CLP to extend the program to their respective schools. CLP Youth Volunteers have taken an initiative to raise funds for teachers' remuneration necessary to run the program in those schools.

Along with these optimistic observations, however, there are challenges. Sustaining the CLCs and SCRs is a major challenge. Unlike a school building, computers and accessories have short life span and need regular repair and replacement that are expensive. Another major item is CLC maintenance cost, which includes teachers' honorarium. Some sponsors consider establishing a CLC and/or a SCR as a one-time donation. When a sponsor stops paying the required 50% (CLP pays the rest) of the annual maintenance fees, it becomes difficult to keep the facility fully effective.

CLCs need more computers so that students have wider access to practice after they complete their training. Another computer course with advanced materials is also necessary. This demand for more computers and advanced materials often come from both students and teachers. Teachers' request for a higher remuneration is also common. One SCR per school is often not enough, especially for schools with large student population. Ideally, every classroom should be an SCR with requisite technology. All of these require more resources.

To sum up, CLP's experience in fostering digital literacy in rural Bangladesh has so far been rewarding, intriguing and challenging. Amidst all the possibilities and problems, CLP volunteers remain committed to the vision of a digitally connected, productive and prosperous Bangladesh that had them started eighteen years ago.

On Receiving the Diana Award

[Rafa Sattar is a recipient of the 2022 Diana Award, which "honors young people who work to improve the lives of others." She is the Founder and President of Fera Foundation, Inc., a not-for-profit organization seeking to foster an enduring relationship built on service between the Bangladeshi diaspora and Bangladesh. Fera Foundation collaborates with CLP on the remote voluntary teaching (RVT) initiative. CLP nominated Rafa for this prestigious award. The 2022 Diana Award Roll of Honor had the following citation for her contribution:

Rafa has always been passionate about women's and children's rights and was alarmed by the scale of learning losses during a nationwide school shutdown in Bangladesh. As she began remotely teaching English at a girls' orphanage, she was saddened to see her students losing their motivation to pursue higher studies. During school shutdowns, Rafa founded a non-profit and a global teaching fellowship from the United States to provide remote schooling and telehealth services to disadvantaged children in Bangladesh. For the past two years, she has coordinated 100 weekly online classes for 450+ underprivileged children in four orphanages, six village schools, and a childcare center in the Daulatdia brothel.

Here Rafa talks about the award, her collaboration with CLP and future endeavors.]

I want to express my sincere appreciation to Computer Literacy Program for Underprivileged (CLP) for nominating me for the Diana Award. The Diana Award honors the legacy of Diana, Princess of Wales by celebrating the selfless contributions of young people who are inspiring the global community to work for the greater good. This is the most prestigious accolade a young person can receive for humanitarian work.

Held on July 1, 2022, the Award Ceremony celebrated the achievements of 184 young humanitarians in a live, virtual ceremony. Prince Harry, the Duke of Sussex also made a surprise appearance and congratulated us all



during the event. It was so inspiring seeing the diversity and breadth of social initiatives launched by young people, and I truly felt like I was a part of a community of global citizens. It was also so empowering to see my work being recognized by a globally renowned platform.

It is such an honor to carry on the legacy of the People's Princess who dedicated her life to dissolving social barriers for the most marginalized communities around the world. I have always held Princess Diana's philanthropic work in support of children's rights near and dear to my heart. Receiving the Diana Award has been a needed reminder for me on the value of the work the Fera Foundation, an international nonprofit I founded, and CLP have accomplished so far and the magnitude of our impact.

It's been a privilege to work with CLP who has established more than 200 smart classrooms in remote villages across Bangladesh. Well before the start of our partnership, the brilliant team at CLP saw the revolutionary potential of online learning and educational technology. Since 2004, CLP has been opening doors for thousands of underprivileged children to receive an interdisciplinary, state-of-the-art education.

Two years ago, I had no professional network in international development. I made my earliest institutional contacts, believe it or not, through social media posts, emails, and Whatsapp texts. I reached out to thousands of institutions and embraced every opportunity few and far between. My work with CLP only became possible through the kind referral of the director at DMNAPK Girls Safe Home. I feel so lucky to have found my greatest advocates in CLP's international network. Since then, CLP and the Fera Foundation have been using communication technology to extend charitable learning opportunities to underprivileged children across Bangladesh.

With CLP, we have been coordinating a volunteer remote teaching program that is burgeoning every day. We are also piloting asynchronous English as a Second Language classes with a marvelous teacher based in the United States, which we hope to expand to all of CLP's beneficiaries. These classes have made it possible for underprivileged children to get a highquality, interdisciplinary education using the most current methodologies in the US education system. I am confident that the innovative programs we have started in collaboration with CLP and Dnet Bangladesh will go on to have a groundbreaking impact on the public education sector as we further develop our curricula and expand to more in-need schools. I truly believe that the remote education will play an important role in achieving educational equity.

Fera literally translates to "return" from my mother tongue Bengali. I dreamed that my nonprofit, the Fera Foundation would give vulnerable women and children around the world the resources they need to "return" and reintegrate into society. I am in awe and continue to learn from CLP's devotion to public service and educational equity. The team here is so dynamic and uplifting. This is the supportive community and positive energy I have needed to grow as a nonprofit leader.

I'm excited to contribute more to the empowering community at CLP. Someday, I hope to pay it forward by giving others the support and warmth I have been shown and needed to get to where I am today. I can only go so far without the support and mentorship of others on this difficult but fulfilling journey. I am so grateful to CLP for believing in my humanitarian ambitions.

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
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Expert Guided Learning

Expert Guided Learning (EGL) is a recent CLP initiative that may bring the outstanding instruction by an expert teacher to any technologically ready classroom anywhere. EGL derives from CLP's considerably successful Remote Voluntary Teaching (RVT) initiative. CLP has been conducting controlled experiments in remote instruction using the communication technology resources of smart classrooms (SCRs) and videoconferencing platforms such as Zoom and Skype.1 Volunteer teachers from within Bangladesh and abroad (such as the US and Australia) have been teaching courses in English, Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics to students in a few rural schools in Bangladesh. During the COVID-19 pandemic RVT turned out to be the only mode instruction for students in an orphanage in Gazipur, Dhaka.

The RVT model commonly involves a volunteer teacher teaching a class in a remote school in real time. Sometimes a local instructor may be present to help run the class and facilitate discussions. However, scaling up and widespread use of this model have several limitations. First, one volunteer teacher teaching a class mode would require many volunteers, which may not be readily available. All teachers are not equally gifted as instructors. Finding and selecting skilled volunteer teachers consume considerable time and manpower that CLP presently cannot afford. Second, sizeable efforts are also required for coordinating each remote class. Third, time difference between volunteer location and Bangladesh restricts class timing and number of classes that may be offered in a SCR per day. Then there are concerns about the availability, quality, dependability, and cost of the Internet connection. EGL is designed to alleviate these limitations and use the exemplary lessons by a master instructor to teach numerous students at different schools following their own schedules and timetables.

The following steps are involved in the design and implementation of an EGL course. First step is to select an effective and inspiring remote teacher (the expert) to teach a course in a subject of interest. Second, the expert teacher (ET) prepares a syllabus and draws out a detailed lesson plan. Third, the ET teaches the class according to the lesson plans following the syllabus. A local teacher (LT) assists the ET during the class period as required. Fourth, every class is video recorded. The recorded video is then edited to erase the classroom voices and noises and only the ET's voice remains on the tape. This edited videotape serves as the instruction material for subsequent delivery of the course. Multiple copies of each video may be made as required. Fifth, for teaching a class using a recorded video in a smart classroom, a LT plays the video which is akin to being guided by the expert. The LT organizes and coordinates lesson and actions in sync with the ET on the videotape. The LT receives prior training on how to coordinate with the ET on the videotape. The local teacher also engages the students in the class, conducts discussions and monitors students' answers to questions posed by the ET on the videotape as required.

As a first step, CLP in collaboration with its partner organization in the RVT program implementation, Fera Foundation Inc., have identified an outstanding expert ESL (English as Second Language) teacher. She has been instructing students at a rural school in Bangladesh in an ESL course comprised of 20 lessons from her own location in New York City. Edited tapes of her classes are being used as an EGL model of ESL instruction

for primary level students. This English learning class following the EGL model is being introduced to 17 schools across Bangladesh under a pilot project for evaluation of the efficacy of the approach. It is instructive to compare the picture of a class taught live by the expert to that taught by a local teacher using a recording of expert's class.



Initial telephone follow-up with several of these schools indicates that the students are enthusiastically participating and benefitting from the program. It is instructive to compare the picture of a class taught live by the expert to that taught by a local teacher using a recording of expert's class. A local teacher who participated in an EGL class commented, "My students thought that they were learning from a live remote teacher."

Along the line of this ESL course, EGL videos on other subjects could be produced as well. In the current pool of remote voluntary teachers, we have identified skilled and highly acclaimed Biology, Chemistry and Physics teachers. Once we roll out the English learning EGL tapes we intend to focus on other areas of critical needs of rural schools.

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Our Participation in the Computer Literacy Program

I have had the privilege of knowing Farooque Bhai (Dr. Mohammad Farooque) since my student days at the Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET). I have been following his noble efforts to help the disadvantaged youths of Bangladesh for more than the past twenty years. Among the latest of his initiatives is the Computer Literacy Program (CLP) and its associated components. I have always admired his dedication to these efforts but did not get actively engaged till I started making small donations some ten years ago. Then, in early 2017, I decided to sponsor a Computer Literacy Center (CLC) at Shakrail High School in my ancestral village.

CLP and its implementation partner Dnet were instrumental in setting up the CLC at Shakrail High School. I dedicated the CLC to honor the memory of my parents, Late Mr. A.K. Saifuddin and Mrs. Raushanara Begum. Dnet set up the CLC in 2018, and during my visit to Bangladesh in early 2019, they were kind enough to take me to Shakrail to see the Center for myself.

It was truly gratifying to see the CLC, and associated SCR, at the school. The teachers appeared enthusiastic, and the students also looked happy to have access to the new gadgets in the computer lab. A healthy number of students participate




in the program, we were told; and we actually saw quite a few of them in the class. What impressed me the



that there was greater participation, and more enthusiasm among the female students. I believe that empowerment of women, who constitute half of Bangladeshi population, is key to moving the country forward. I returned from Shakrail that day with a feeling of gratitude and contentment at having been able to contribute, in however small way, to the learning climate in my native village.

In May 2019, I sponsored another CLC near my wife's ancestral village. Once again, with the effective leadership of CLP, and the expert help of the Dnet the CLC at Syedpur Abdur Rahman High School was established during 2019. Accompanied by a Dnet representative, we visited the Page 21CLC at Syedpur in February 2020. The enthusiasm of the teachers and the students were easily discernible. We dedicated the CLC to my parents-in-law, Mr. M. Nuruzzaman Khan and Mrs. Sharifa Zaman.

We subsequently decided to resurrect seven "tokai" CLC's in Manikganj. Tokai CLCs are centers that were previously established by sponsors years ago but could not remain fully active since the sponsors discontinued their annual maintenance support which is only 50% of what CLP needs to sustain full operation of a center. According to a recent Dnet report, those seven tokai centers are now functional and are contributing to computer-aided learning in their home institutions. Locations of all nine schools with active CLCs supported by us are shown in the adjoining map.




It gives us a lot of satisfaction to be able to contribute, in our small way, in promoting computerbased education in Bangladeshi villages. In my view, this is one of the best, and most gratifying, ways we can attempt to help our compatriots who often have the talent, but not the tools, to advance themselves in an increasingly global and competitive world. We are indebted to CLP and Dnet, for providing us with this opportunity to participate in this constructive endeavor.

The other day, I opened my computer and saw there was a Facebook message from Juthi Akter. I immediately recognized her. It was the bright-eyed student from my 2019 Physics class. For a moment I stopped and contemplated the simple message from one of my students. A decade ago, I could not have dreamt to receive a message let alone an electronic message from a student in Bagerhat College while I am in Plainsboro, New Jersey, USA. In 2019, I started teaching Physics once a week to students of Uddipan Badar-Shamsu Bidyani-ketan at Chitali, Bagerhat., on Zoom. Those familiar with remote villages of Bangladesh and New Jersey would immediately appreciate the stark unreal setting. As the figure below shows Google computed the shortest distance between my home and the School in Baitpur is 7,970.31 miles (12,826.97 Km). I did not have the opportunity to explain to my Physics students, why the shortest distance is a curve through Greenland. May be the Geography Teacher will have fun explaining that.



Juthi was a bright student and did very well in her exams and as a result she has moved on in her carrier.

What I demonstrated above may be mundane in western standard, but it is a remarkable feat. I have enjoyed teaching every class—from Archimedes to Galileo, from force, mass, momentum to electric potential. Every Monday night (which is Tuesday morning in Bangladesh) I turn on Zoom and get connected face to face to my students in Uddipon School. Their wide-eyed attention gets me motivated. Like Juthi, I had Kajol, Mim and Kakoli in the following year and this year I have Fatema, Rifat and Suriya and others. I am convinced that virtually all of them will do well in life. Teaching Physics on Zoom is challenging. But Internet has made it convenient. I can draw animated experiments from the internet even though I cannot perform an actual one in front of them. The distance (physical, socio-economic, clock time) does not matter. We are getting ahead. I look forward to continue my Physics lectures for the foreseeable future.

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
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
